UNCTAD Webinar Series on SDG Reporting by companies, including MSMEs

The adaption of "Guidance on core indicators for entity reporting on contribution towards implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals (GCI)" for the LATAM region

Summary Report

1. Attendance

The event took place online using Microsoft Teams on June 04th 2021. It was attended by 55 participants from 14 countries in the LATAM region. The full list of participants is attached in the Appendix section.

2. Objectives and agenda

The objective of the webinar on the GCI delivered on 4 June 2021 for the LATAM region was to provide information on the main aspects of Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) reporting and the GCI, highlight findings from case studies conducted, and discuss further steps on the GCI implementation in the Latin American region, including in the MSME sector.

This initiative is part of UNCTAD activities implemented within the framework of the UN Development Account project "Global Initiative towards post-Covid-19 resurgence of the Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) sector" (MSME surge project) and its Cluster of 'Improving Access to Finance". The initiative aims to strengthen the capacity and resilience of MSMEs in developing countries and economies in transition to mitigate the economic and social impact of the global Covid-19 crisis to seize the opportunity to build a greener and more inclusive economy.

The webinar began with opening remarks by Mr. Richard Bolwijn, Officer in charge of the Enterprise Branch at UNCTAD. He welcomed the attendees and emphasized the importance of the MSME sector worldwide as contributors to the economy, employment, self-employment and as drivers for innovation and development. He introduced UNCTAD's program on enterprise and accounting reporting which is carried out through the Intergovernmental Working Group of Experts on International Standards of Accounting and Reporting (ISAR). Moreover, he highlighted UNCTAD's work on enhancing the role of enterprise reporting in assessing the private sector's contribution to the SDG implementation, and mentioned recent international developments in this area such as a consultation paper suggesting the creation of an International Sustainability Standards Board under the governance of the IFRS Foundation and the adoption of a proposal for a Corporate Sustainability Reporting Directive by the European Commission which will amend its existing Non-Financial Reporting Directive (NFRD). He stressed the urgency and importance of transparent measurement and disclosure of sustainability information.

Mr. Bolwijn said that the objective of the webinar was to provide information on the main aspects of Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) reporting and UNCTAD's Guidance on core indicators (GCI), highlight findings from GCI case studies conducted in the region, and discuss further steps on the GCI implementation in Latin America, including in the MSME sector.

Ms. Isabel Garza Rodriguez, Economic Affairs Officer (UNCTAD), gave a presentation on Sustainability/SDG reporting and measurement of the contribution of the private sector to the implementation of the SDGs. She further elaborated on current developments in the sustainability reporting area and on the GCI core indicators, its training manual and the importance of the application of these tools in order to achieve high quality reports to measure the contribution of companies to the SDGs. Then, she provided information about the GCI case studies that UNCTAD has developed in the last years, its main objectives, focus and a summary of the companies that have participated globally.

Subsequently, Mr. Juan Pablo Morataya, Executive Director of CentraRSE and focal point of the Development Account Project in Guatemala, spoke of the importance of SDG reporting and the GCI as a model for these reports. He also provided an analysis of the corporate reporting trends and its applicability in Guatemala and the LATAM region. He emphasized that the GCI is a practical tool applicable to all companies regardless of size or industry. He said that the GCI facilitates sustainability reporting and promotes comparability and verifiability of such information. In addition, it supports the collection of data by governments on the contribution of the private sector to the implementation of the SDGs.

Mr. Wilmar Franco, President of the Technical Council on Public Accounting in Colombia, underscored the importance of highquality accounting and corporate reports for the SDGs and the development of the LATAM region. He highlighted the fact that the majority of the private sector companies in the region are MSMEs, hence the importance of simple and practical tools in order to improve sustainability reporting and to promote compliance with corporate reporting international standards. He spoke of the GCI and its training manual and said that through the knowledge and application of these tools, companies can start reporting on sustainability from scratch considering the SDGs or those already reporting can update their current practices.

Mr. Colin Banning, UNCTAD's Resource person, presented the results of the GCI case studies carried out in 3 Guatemalan companies. He stressed that these companies were able to report between 29 and 30 indicators out of the 33 indicators of the GCI. He shared lessons learned and highlighted that the environmental indicators where the most difficult to report for the Guatemalan companies because they lack the systems to collect data needed for their measurement. There were also challenges with some of the social and corporate governance indicators. The conclusions of the case studies focused on the importance of providing training to companies on how to report environmental, social and corporate governance information. Mr. Banning underscored the usefulness of the GCI and its training manual to support companies when preparing the information. He mentioned the importance of providing collaboration between the public and the private sector. He also stressed the urgent need for a sustainability reporting regulation or framework to ensure consistency and reliability of sustainability reports. Finally, he recommended companies the implementation of an internal mechanism for data collection that allows to produce sustainability reports.

Afterwards, Mr. Felipe Janica V., EY Partner, Assurance Managing Partner LATAM North Region, presented the results of the GCI case study carried out in a Colombian company. The case study showed that Promigas reported on most indicators and had challenges in reporting 5 GCI indicators. Mr Janica highlighted the need for verification manuals that can be used by both external and internal personnel to reduce errors in the reported data. He stressed that the accounting systems need to adapt and become integrated in order to be able to trace the information. He said the GCI is useful because it provides explanations and information on the methodology to calculate the indicators, and its training manual also contains a list of references and examples. He commented that the GCI could become baseline information applicable to all type of entities regardless of sector or size. Mr. Janica also spoke of the need for regulation to promote sustainability reporting, as well as the need for assurance of such reports. He addressed the role of the local governments in adapting and integrating all these requirements and standards into their legal frameworks in order to achieve consistency in SDG corporate reporting practices in the LATAM region.

The moderator, Ms. Debora Ponce, vice chair ISAR 37, then addressed the comments and questions made by the audience in the chat and opened the floor for further comments, questions and interactive discussions. After the discussion, UNCTAD informed participants about the 38th session of ISAR which will take place in November 2021 and will also deal with sustainability/SDG reporting.

3. Comments and questions from participants


The comments and questions were collected using the chat and also through discussions during the webinar, some of the key ones are as follows:

- In Argentina we are currently working with SDG12, especially regarding Circular Economy.
- It is my opinion that, without a regulation, preparing the sustainability reports will be a challenge for the region.
- Regarding the indicator on the audit committee, I think that the problem is not the number of meetings and their attendance rate, but what is reported to them and what actions the committee does to monitor compliance with corrective actions.
- Should sustainability reports be prepared only by a professional accountant?
- What is the difference or connection between the GRI and the GCI?


4. Feedback results

2) Country


